THE WOLF IS BACK Children's Museum will hold Wolf Night 2008

WEST HARTFORD, September 25, 2008 - The wolf will be back at The Children's Museum in West Hartford. The Children's Museum will hold Wolf Night 2008, an evening of wolf discovery, on Friday, October 3, 2008, at 7 p.m.

This popular event is presented by The Children's Museum with support from The Wolf Conservation Center. Wolf Night 2008 includes an up-close encounter with Atka, a live Artic Grey Wolf, as well as a fascinating and informative presentation about the lives, history, and predatory roles of wolves in nature.

"This is always a great family event. The range for North American wolves is growing again, but this animal still remains a mix of fairy tale and myth for most children. But here, it's up close and personal," said Cindy King, Director of the Museum's UTC Wildlife Sanctuary.
